



## WADJEMUP ONLINE DATABASE

*A history of Aboriginal incarceration at Rottneſt Prison 1900-1931*

### Information Flyer

The Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries (DLGSC) Aboriginal History division (AHWA) has completed research for an historical project on Wadjemup (Rottneſt) between 1900-1931. Families and community members with ancestors who were imprisoned there are invited to participate in this initiative by contacting us.

### Background

Wadjemup has been a part of the story of West Australian for over 30,000 years. Between 1838-1931 the island was used to incarcerate many Aboriginal people from across the ſtate who were convicted of committing a crime, ſuch as ſtealing a loaf of bread or more ſerious crimes. Some were ſentenced under the legislation at the time while many were ſentenced for offences committed under the *Aborigines Act 1905*. Other offences related to tribal acts including payback or other cultural practices that were offences under Western Law but not ſo within the cultural groups of the offenders. Irreſpective of the conviction, the ſentencing of an Aboriginal person to Wadjemup was often ſeen as an opportunity to remove them from a location.

### What is the project?

The DLGSC Aboriginal History division (AHWA) has completed research focusing on the history of Wadjemup in an online database which identifies and provides a detailed ſnapshot of the 386 men, three boys and one woman who were ſent to the island between 1900-1931. The project is unique to previous publications in that it incorporates a thematic overview, a comprehensive database and over 100 individual photographs, collectively providing an insight into the lives of the prisoners during the final 31 years of the prison.

## What type of information is included in the database?

Included in the database are details about where each person was sent from, their admission and discharge dates, offences committed, occupation and occurrences while on the island, a photograph where possible, and what happened to them after their release. The information also includes birthdate, place of birth, family connections and other notes.

## Research process and historical archives

The research process has involved examining hundreds of historical archives, such as Fremantle Prison Registers, Convict Establishment Records, Police Occurrence Books, newspaper articles and much more. These archives are publicly available, open access items that have been retrieved from the State Records Office of Western Australia and JS. Batty Library. Some information is restricted and will only be accessible to the direct descendants through a Family History Application process.

## Where can I find the Wadjemup project?

The project will be formally launched and published on the Department's website in early 2021. In the meantime, we will be providing regular updates and information on the AHWA website at [www.dlgsc.wa.gov.au/wadjemup](http://www.dlgsc.wa.gov.au/wadjemup).
